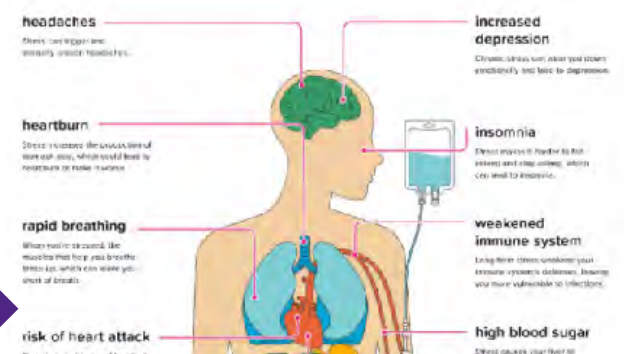

## How students can cope with stress during final exam week

The end of the spring semester may bring increased stress levels for students, but there are healthy ways for TCU students to cope with the stress.

According to the American Institute of Stress (AIS), stress is a natural physical and mental reaction to life experiences, but your health can be affected if your stress levels stay elevated for too long.

The AIS reported that symptoms of stress

can include depression, headaches, insomnia and more.

“We tend to see a rise in illnesses and clinic visits during the end of the semester,” said Kelle Tillman, associate medical director at the TCU Health Center.

According to the AIS, some of the most common signs of stress are frequent headaches, grinding teeth, stuttering and neck and back pain.

“If students are feeling the effects of stress, they can go to the wellness center, the health clinic or the religious spiritual life building if they need counseling,” Tillman

said.

Students tend to get in a habit of relying on unhealthy ways to stay up all night to finish assignments or study for a test. Some students rely on energy drinks to do this, but Dr. Tillman said that those will just lead students to a crash the next day.

“Don’t try to load up on caffeine,” Tillman said. “An apple has as much caffeine effect as a cup of coffee.”

Dr. Tillman also said that students should not stay up late the night before to study for a final because you can only study so much.

“The brain has to stop,” Tillman said. “It’s like a filing cabinet. You can only put so much into the cabinet and then the brain has to stop and get replenished for the next day.”

# Visitor side of Frog Alley garage is open for students during storms

If there’s one thing students consistently complain about, it’s parking.

There are about 11,000 parking spots available on campus and 9,000 issued parking permits, yet students still feel there is a lack of parking, said Adrian Andrews, the assistant vice chancellor of public safety.

Complaints often center around the

availability of close parking, covered parking and what to do with cars when there’s a threat of hail.

At TCU, spring thunderstorms can result in hail damage to cars, and students living on campus worry about their vehicles. Many often rush to find covered parking in the few spaces available in Frog Alley Parking Garage.

What many students don’t know is the guards at TCU open the gate on the visitor side of

Frog Alley for students, faculty and staff to park their cars when there is a threat of severe weather.

Still, the lack of covered parking is frustrating for some students, even when there are no storms.

“Covered parking is better for cars, especially when it gets hot, so it sucked having to park on the top of the garage or in the other lots in August,” said Haley Lefevre, a junior psychology major. “I would always have to plan out my time after

football games to go get my car to get a covered spot.”

Andrews said TCU’s Parking and Transportation unit is also researching what it would take to reallocate at least half of the visitor parking spaces to main campus students to allow students to park on the visitor side of Frog Alley permanently.

### Other parking concerns

Some students complain about parking in far-away lots and say they continue to rack up fines for parking illegally.

On average, security guards write around 50 tickets per day and 250

tickets per week.

“I am frustrated with [parking far away] sometimes because I feel like we shouldn’t have to park so far away on campus,” said Luke Hamilton, a junior biology major.

But Andrews said parking on TCU’s campus was purposefully designed to be on the perimeters so that the focus could be on the landscaping and beauty.

“I always felt 19 years ago that TCU was a parking lot surrounded by a campus. It’s now a campus surrounded by a parking lot,” Chancellor Victor Boschini said. “Some people don’t like that because they want their parking right in

front.”

New concerns surround parking due to plans to build two new residence halls and a dining hall.

A parking consulting agency is currently conducting an impact evaluation, but as of right now, there is no need for additional parking, Andrews said.

Boschini said he would prefer to focus on parking for commuter students because they are the ones who need it for class. As for students living on campus, they should walk, Boschini said.

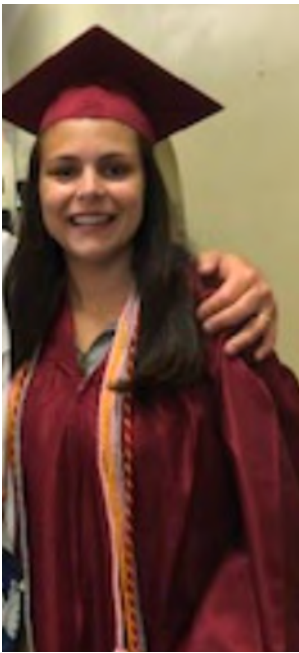

Zaap Kitchen recently established its newest location in the WestBend retail center, near University Park. This Lao and Thai street food replaced PopBar popsicles with a completely new cuisine of traditional Thai noodle

and soup dishes.

## Lunch with a view

Press Cafe is a modern twist on coffee to cocktails, open for breakfast, weekend brunch, lunch and dinner. Go and grab an appetizer of choice after a

bike ride on Trinity Trail or come with family and dog in tow for an evening meal.

The Trinity Trail location has full deck patio seating and two stories of indoor seating and bar. All outdoor seating is dog-friendly with a view of the start of the Trinity Trail.

Happy hour offers a more affordable option for drinks and appetizers Monday through Thursday from 3 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. and 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. on Mondays.

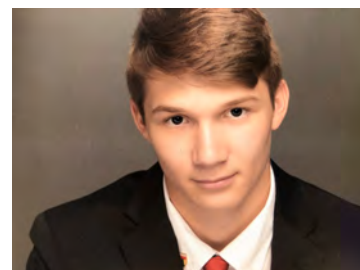

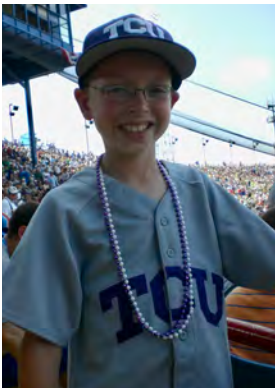

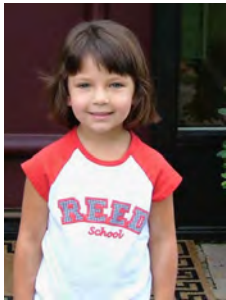

With names such as the Republican, the Democrat and the Trailer Park, Torchy's offers tacos made from scratch and keeps the menu updated with monthly specials featuring a few

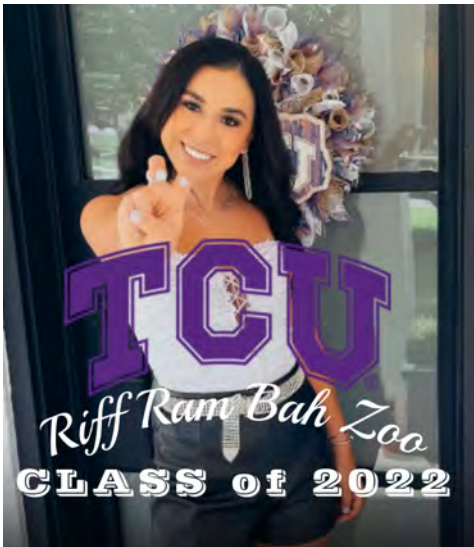
vegetarian and a wide variety of meat options.

# Local Ukrainian potters use their works to help homeland, cope with war

Five years of cups and plates filled Vasfie Abdurafeeva's husband's office and overflowed into the garage.

She and her sister-in-law Anna Andriets began taking ceramic classes for fun when they moved to the U.S. almost a decade ago. But once Russia invaded Ukraine, the fun was gone.

"I have this feeling like I am guilty because I am not in Ukraine," Anna said. "I live here in this safe place, but a lot of Ukrainians now not in the safe place, and it's

hard to understand. I just didn't understand how all this could happen."

For nearly two months, air raid sirens have blasted warnings in Ukraine as Russian missiles fall from the sky. Major cities have been reduced to rubble, and tales of atrocities are beginning to emerge.

The women do not know when they will see their extended families in-person again. They watched from Flower Mound as major cities crumpled into ruins and millions of Ukrainians became refugees.

They didn’t just want to stand by. So they began selling their ceramics — cups, plates and tea sets — to raise money for Ukraine.

Many of the festivals are in Fort Worth. The women leave home around 7 a.m. to make the 40 minute drive. It takes them two hours

to set up the tent and shelves where they display their wares. They don’t get home until 6 p.m.

“We got everything to enjoy our life and then suddenly there’s something happening and you just cannot believe,” Vasfie said. “It doesn’t fit in my brain. I cannot believe.”

Vasfie and Anna

are from Crimea. The peninsula in Eastern Europe, situated along the northern coast of the Black Sea, became a part of Ukraine in 1991. But Russia claimed it in 2014.

Anna left in 2014 with her husband and two daughters. Vasfie and her husband and son followed a year later.

Vasfie’s extended family —parents,

siblings, nieces and nephews — remain in Russian-controlled Crimea. Anna’s parents are there too.

**War-torn**

But, it’s hard to stay in touch. Russia has blocked Facebook, Instagram and other social media.

“It is really difficult just because you wake up and you don’t know what’s going to happen today or tomorrow,” Vasfie said.

They talk on Skype and social media through a VPN, or a virtual private network, that shields their activities.

“I really want to see my nieces and nephews,” Vasfie said. “They’re cute. They’re growing.

The biggest fear maybe because Russia is getting isolated right now, so I don’t know how it’s going to be there, you know?”

Anna had a plane ticket to visit her mom this summer. But Crimea won’t accept her Ukrainian or U.S. passport.

Many of their friends live in Ukraine.

Vasfie said one friend

fled to Poland. What should have been an eight-hour trip took 24 hours.

“It’s quiet, it’s peaceful here,” Vasfie said her friend told her. “I can hear birds and it’s just weird silent.”

“I feel relieved because I was worried about her,” Vasfie said.

But there are others she hasn’t heard from.

“I feel for all of these people because we are all family,” Vasfie said.

Anna’s relatives live in central Ukraine in Vinnytsia. They are OK, but their city was bombed several times. Some of her friends have fled to Poland and Germany from Kharkiv and Kyiv.

“I really adore our people in Ukraine now because they are strong and they are rocks,” Anna said. “I have feelings inside of me that I’m proud of them.”

Vasfie and Anna couldn’t stand to watch the news each day and do nothing about what they were seeing.

*“When we see how strong people in Ukraine are, we want to be the same here. We just want to help in the way we can.”*

For the first two weeks after the invasion, Anna said she was “like a zombie.” She was constantly reading the news and trying to control the situation, but she couldn’t.

“And then I told her you need to start just making stuff and get yourself busy because it’s not good for you,” Vasfie said. “All these festivals really helps, because when you go and you speak up, we talk to

people and they support — actually that means a lot.”

Vasfie said one of the customers wanted to buy a \$15 cup. They asked if \$15 was enough to help.

To prepare for the festivals, they focus on making popular items like cups. But their days in the studio have always been long. Most days, Vasfie arrives before 8 a.m. and doesn't leave until 6 p.m.

"I kind of live here," Vasfie said. "The other day, I made 20 cups."

**Sharing the Culture**

Selling their pieces also helps show Americans their culture.

"It's something I really enjoy, and when you enjoy it and make others happy that's just the main goal of what I'm doing," Vasfie said. "And introducing of course my culture."

Vasfie carves traditional Crimean Tatar symbols called Örnek into her work. The symbols are arranged to create a narrative composition. Vasfie is studying the meaning of the different symbols and how to arrange them. But this is a challenge.

Örnek originated by Crimean Tatar communities. Crimean Tatars or Crimeans are a Turkic ethnic group and nation who are an indigenous people of Crimea. In 1944, during World War II, Crimean Tatars were deported to Central Asia by the Soviet government.

They lost a lot of their cultural history, including the meanings behind Örnek symbols.

Anna decorates her pieces with Örnek too, but she also enjoys creating designs from her imagination.

She carves and glazes sunflowers because they remind her of the sunflower fields in the Ukraine countryside.

The black walnuts on some of her pieces are an ode to her grandmother who had a black walnut tree in her backyard when Anna was growing up.

"I think art makes us better," Anna said. "If you create something, you can give your good

energy and spread your good energy to people."

Crimean artists are trying to restore the meanings of Örnek, and Vasfie is determined to learn.

Tulips symbolize the male. The almond flower represents kids. Bigger almond flowers represent the female. Pomegranates symbolize abundance. Triangles symbolize stability.

"All of them are new for me, and I'm learning how to combine symbols," Vasfie said. She added, "I'm trying to learn more and improve my work, make it more meaningful."

Don't press send: Cyber 'sextortion' of students becoming more common

A growing number of TCU students have reported being preyed on in cyber blackmail schemes this year after being sexually coerced by people online, according to the TCU Police Department.

"A problem we're having here is with students sending intimate pictures and then being blackmailed to send money to not release those pictures," said Detective Mike McCormack with TCU Police.

In a recent case on campus, police said the male student "felt comfortable" accepting a friend request because the scammer had multiple mutual friends with him.

However, the spam account, or 'finsta', exploited the student for money. McCormack suspects that these predators send out thousands of requests to their network of contact lists.

TCU police have sent legal letters to the social media platform used in this incident but added that even with a court

order, it's improbable that the location of the culprit can be found due to false information.

According to TCU Police, Instagram and Snapchat are the most common platforms used to sexually coerce students online, and male students are the most common victim of this type of coercion.

Prevention & support

The TCU Police and Counseling & Mental Health Center said they want to address the stigma that causes males not to report issues of

sexual harassment.

"It could happen to anybody at a vulnerable point," said Chief of Police Robert Rangel. "It doesn't make the victim any less of a person because they fell for that scam. We're all the same. Everybody wants to be loved."

TCU Police and the counseling center are urging students not to send pictures that could be used against them by known and unknown sources.

"Once it's out there you have no control over it," said Leah Carnahan, the assistant

director of Campus Advocacy, Resources and Education.

Students should also stay vigilant of who they choose to follow on social media, they said.

TCU offers confidential support to help students who have become victims of cyber extortion.

The CARE office is a resource for current students to use and is located in the Counseling Center in Jarvis Hall.

To prevent the situation from escalating, the TCU Police Department recommends, in the case

of being extorted, not to wire money to the blackmailer.

Scammers are not known to stop at the first request, McCormack said.

Students are encouraged to file a police report regarding these types of offenses but the chances of tracking down the suspect or retrieving the money or pictures are a needle in a haystack at best.

That's why the best thing to do to ensure safety is: DON'T PRESS SEND.

# Art and science collide in TCU zoo enrichment course

The intersection of art and ecology is on display in a zoo enrichment course offered on campus.

Co-taught by environmental science associate professor Dr. Victoria “Tory” Bennett and studio art professor Cameron “Cam” Schoepp, MFA, the zoo enrichment course explores the ecological behavior of wild animals to gain insights into the types of stimuli that they encounter naturally. Students then develop

and build structures meant to engage and enrich the lives of animals at the Fort Worth Zoo.

The students work in teams to study a specific species at the zoo and create objects that will enhance their lives in captivity.

“This wouldn’t work if we didn’t have the art students combined with the ecology students. You can make all sorts of things and put them in the zoo, but if you don’t have the background on ecology, you can’t possibly design something that will

be that effective,” said Bennett. “Same goes for the ecology students, they can’t weld to save their life. They couldn’t come up with these ideas. That combination and collaboration makes it work. It is an example of how you need every aspect of art and science to solve world problems, or in this case, zoo enrichment.”

Bennett and Shoeppe created the course over nine years ago, and it’s offered every other year. The duo recruits students — graduates and undergraduates — to take the course.

“We draw from a pool of students who have completed certain prerequisites and would work well with this particular group,” said Schoepp. “We encourage them to take the class, because we can’t necessarily make them sign up.”

Both professors assess their students’ personalities, strengths and weaknesses to determine the perfect group.

“We have teams of three: one advanced ecologist, one advanced artist and a little wiggle room for either or, or a newbie,” said Bennett.

Group 1:

Senior environmental science major Gloria Serrano and Master of Fine Arts (MFA) graduate students Benjamin Loftis and Madi Ortega are focusing their efforts on the Hyacinth Macaw, a stunning cobalt blue bird with yellow coloring around its eyes and the base of its beak. It is the largest parrot in the macaw family.

“We saw that she didn’t have the ability to apply her full strength with her beak,” said Serrano. “Everything

that was given to her, she destroyed.”

The group decided to create something that would make the macaw work for her food, instead of just having it placed in her cage.

“Our idea is to not only create something that is sturdy for her, but also something that challenges her food acquisition,” Serrano said. “This forces her to manipulate something in order for her to receive an award and really allows her to attack it.”

Their creation looks like a chandelier. Food is placed inside the top where it spills into different places within the structure where the bird has to retrieve it. The structure is made out of 3D plastic, then printed and waxed into form. The group plans to dip it in wax and finally cast it in aluminum. “It is designed so that everything inside allows her to use the full force of her beak,” said Serrano.

**Group 2:**

Lauren Griffin, a senior combined science major, Nathan Little, a senior sculpture major and Sydney Martin, a junior studio art painting major, are focused on the gray fox. They are sometimes known as the “tree fox” or “cat fox” because it is one of two species of canid that climb trees. Their rotating wrists and semi-retractable claws allow them to climb high

to den, forage or escape predators. Marshall, the gray fox at the Fort Worth Zoo, has an indoor and outdoor enclosure. “On the outside, he didn’t have anything he could use his natural abilities to climb trees,” said Griffin. “Gray foxes forage in trees in the wild. They like to evade predators and play using trees. Trees are just a huge part of their natural instinct in the wild.”

The group wanted to maximize the enclosure vertically. Marshall’s enclosure isn’t large, but the group felt that they could double the space by making it vertical.

The group decided to make a tree out of PVC pipe and rubber. The textured rubber looks like tree bark. Marshall will be able to sink his claws into it and climb to the top.

“The zookeepers can also put food up there so there is a reason for him to climb the tree,” said Griffin. “He is going to mimic these natural

foraging habits by climbing these trees to get food.”

**Group 3:**

Lane Rosal, a sophomore sculpture major, Davion Mack, a junior sculpture major and Taylor Craig, a senior environmental science major, are working with the Patagonian Mara, a

large rodent with long hare-like ears and a body that resembles a small deer.

“In his natural habitat, he would go around from place to place and graze with his species group,” said Rosal. “He doesn’t have anything like that in the zoo because he is in a small offsite enclosure with concrete flooring.”

He was being fed

from a dog bowl so his access to food was very immediate – much different from foraging in the wild.

“We are trying to create a feeder for him that’s very similar to a snuffle mat for dogs,” said Rosal. “It would encourage him to actually search for food as he would be in the wild. It would also encourage

him to move from spot to spot like they do in the wild.”

Rosal’s group is looking for donations via gofundme to help pay for project expenses. 100% of the proceeds go towards constructing the mara’s feeder.

# Froggie 5-0 considers, tests new changes in preparation for the fall

A task force is considering changes to Froggie 5-0 that could minimize the late night golf cart service and instead have students opt for buddy walking.

“This is something that is in consideration but is not definitive,” said Jake Evinger, head supervisor of Froggie 5-0 and senior economics and philosophy double-major.

The student-run safety service is deliberating the use of a walking buddy system that would supplement its shuttle service this fall.

The idea behind making these changes is to focus on students’ safety and to limit the cost of golf carts, but nothing has been finalized.

“The safety of our students is the number one priority for the

school,” said Adrian Andrews, associate vice chancellor of public safety at TCU.

Students have been accustomed to calling the Froggie 5-0 hotline so a student worker in a golf cart can meet the student and transport them across campus to their destination.

Last week, Froggie 5-0 beta-tested a strategy in which students who called the Froggie 5-0 hotline were asked if they have a safety concern. If it was a true safety concern, then the safety team met and escorted the student or students to their desired location.

The test, however, resulted in delays that left a student harmed, according to Head of Froggie 5-0 Jake Evinger. The test is not part of its procedure now.

Some reasons for the potential changes are attributed to the cost of golf carts.

“Froggie 5-0 receives upwards of 90 calls a night and about less than three to five are actual safety concerns,” said Andrews.

Because they run on gas, constantly running the carts at night is costly. Golf carts also have to be replaced for around \$10,000 a cart

every two to three years because they need lots of maintenance.

Froggie 5-0 runs from 7 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. If a student needs safety

assistance after 12:30 a.m., the TCU Police Department is available for escorts.

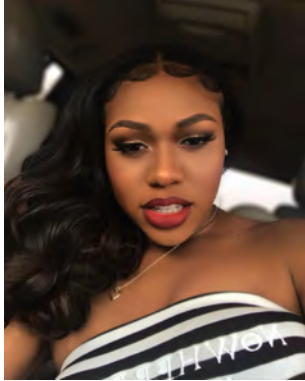

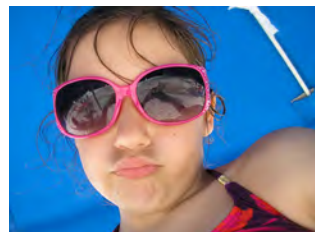

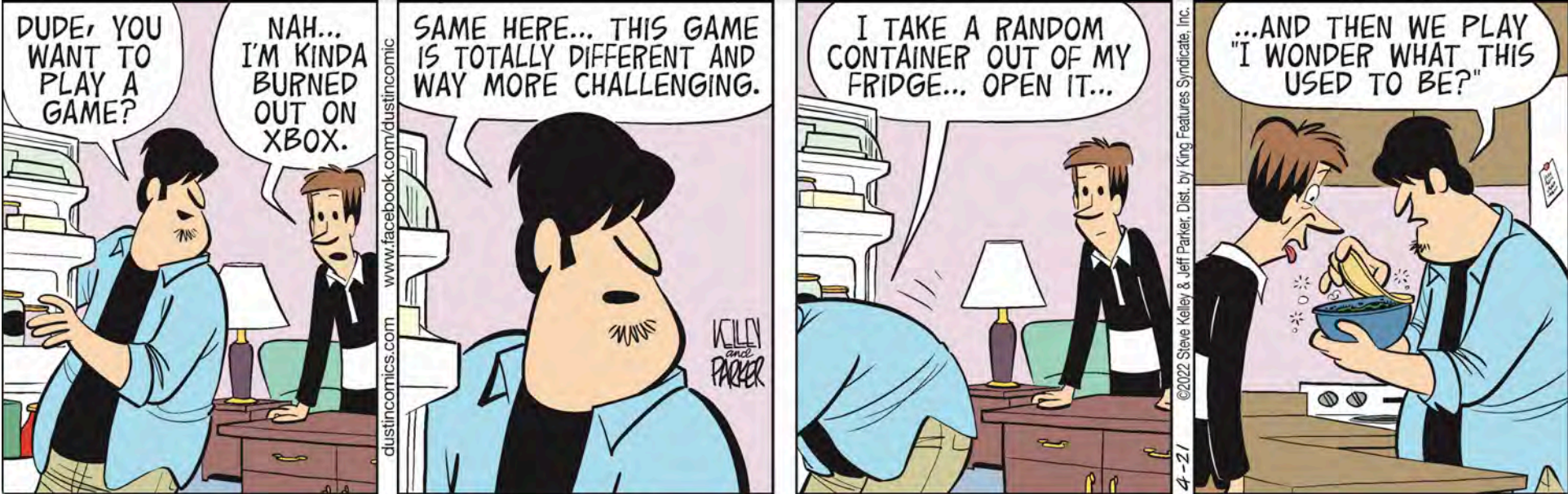
